- 3. Apportionments are being paid at a rate of 10% of collections.

Algonquin/Lake in the Hills Food Pantry – On Feb.2 we collected 186 lbs. of non-perishable food on "Souper Bowl Sunday"

Imagine No Malaria – March2014- Kickoff for INM campaign. Information and goal was given to congregation. Goal is \$7500 by Dec 2016

School Tool Box Program - The month of April we collected \$1160 and were able to fill 40 backpacks with school supplies for a needy school in the local school district

TLS Veterans - In April we collected 49 lbs. of food for their pantry

Get Your Can To Church – June – On the first Sunday of each month we ask the Congregation to bring non-perishable food for the food pantry. Those who forget may put loose change in a coffee can

June collection – 78 lbs. of food and \$40 cash

July collection – 150 lbs. of food and \$51 cash

Aug. collection – 147 lbs. of food and \$45.67 cash

Sept. - 92 lbs of food

All donations were given to Algonquin/LITH Food Pantry

Community Parking Lot Yard Sale - June 21 - Proceeds from rental of space and tables amounted to \$290 and money went to Imagine No Malaria fund

Colonial Café fundraiser - Aug.21 – Percentage of sales for three days amounted to 547.80. Proceeds went to Imagine No Malaria fund

To date (Sept 2014) a total of \$2900 has been collected for Imagine No Malaria. \$1100 has been sent to the Northern Illinois Conference

For the remainder of the year our Mission events are:

Bake Sale – Sept. 21 – Proceeds will go to Imagine No Malaria

Cardunal Crop Walk – Oct. 19 – Monetary donations will benefit PADS and Illinois Food Bank (which will be split between the Algonquin/LITH Food Pantry & the Fish Carpentersville Food Pantry)

Warm Ministry - Oct. – we will collect gloves, mittens, scarves, and hats for needy children

Home of the Sparrow Giving Tree – WE will collect Holiday presents for a HOS family.

Prayer Shawl Ministry

Helping Hands is the Prayer Shawl Ministry at CUMC. We provide handmade shawls, cross stitch bookmarks and prayer boxes that have been prayed over by our group. Upon request, these are presented to family members, friends and neighbors of our community during challenging times in their lives.

In 2014 we have given 15 prayer shawls – 5 of those were given to Sherman Hospital in Elgin. We offer cross stitch book marks to church members on a table in the narthex. We have also given out care boxes which contain small wrapped gifts with biblical sayings to open daily during a difficult time. Prayer boxes constructed by our members are offered to new members and those visiting our church.

We meet on the second Monday of each month except July and December. We generally have 8 or more women attend as we conduct our meeting, work on our projects, and enjoy coffee and treats. We also have some ladies who make shawls, but are unable to attend our meetings; for these shawl donations we are very grateful. We collect a donation from each member and that money was used as \$75 donation to the "No More Malaria" campaign.

This is a special ministry that offers us the opportunity to meet and to help out other people who are suffering and need God's healing touch. If you are interested in crocheting, knitting, or cross stitching, we would welcome anyone to join us. We will be happy to help you get started. The love of this church is far reaching and the Christ United Methodist Church flame shines around the world through the Prayer Shawl Ministry.

Stephen Ministry

Stephen Ministry – a ministry of care. Individuals go through a very detailed training program to become Stephen Ministers. We are so lucky to have dedicated people on our Stephen Ministry team. Each Stephen Minister makes a Covenant of Confidentiality, which is a promise made to every care receiver.

We have Stephen Ministers working in different roles. Some are ready to provide immediate support in a crisis situation, others are providing on-going care and we all are Prayer Warriors. As the result of a survey within the Stephen Minister group, we changed peer supervision from bi-monthly to once-amonth meetings. Our typical meeting also includes on-going training for everyone. Each Stephen Minister is also available for meetings based on the needs of their care receiver.

Stephen Ministry at Christ Church can go beyond our church family and the walls of our building and includes serving the community. We are prepared to provide care in any situation. We have also reached out to a church in Crystal Lake to help us provide a Stephen Minister for a member of our congregation and to assist in providing training for new Stephen Ministers. We are always available to answer questions about this ministry to anyone interested in becoming a part of it, whether as a care receiver or a Stephen Minister.

Stephen Ministers know that we offer only care-giving and that we leave the cure-giving to God. The support Stephen Ministers give to one another is a gift we each have been given. Stephen Ministry is often called "After Care" – after the death, after the divorce, after a relationship change. We are able to walk one-on-one with someone going through a dark time in their life. It is our privilege to serve God through this ministry.

Worship Design Team

Our youth have served the congregation and community in many ways. This year our youth enjoyed being a big part of Vacation Bible School. They served as actors for skits and activity assistants in our 3D Agency VBS. Our youth again were standout helpers bonding with participants and leaders of the different activities.

In March nine youth, along with two volunteer youth from the community, served at the PADS center at Cary United Methodist Church. They made beds and served dinner to the 50+ residents in the shelter. They were commended on their hospitality and humility as they served those who came to shelter.

They participated in a "30 Hour Famine", and raised money for the world hunger relief. They visited the local animal shelter and participated in the Cardunal CROPWALK to fight hunger. Our youth were a great help in this past year's Bethlehem Marketplace. They helped with the set, activities and breakdown.

We have Youth Education most Sundays during the 10:00 am service. Youth Explosion has meetings/outings about three times per month. There are 13 middle and high school youth that regularly attend our events and services.

The numerous fun events we held over the past year included putt-putt, a super bowl party, two overnight "lock ins", an overnight trip to a lake cottage, bowling, laser tag and various events that involved food, movies and games.

Report of the Clergy

Pastor's Report

"Very truly, I tell you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit." (John 12:24)

As we are celebrating 25 years in ministry as Christ United Methodist Church, I am thinking about those who decided to "die and be resurrected" to the Glory of the Lord! After the faithful people of the Lake In The Hills United Methodist Church tearfully held their closing service on October 8th, 1989, they joyfully held the very first service of Christ United Methodist Church on the following

Sunday, October 15th at Crystal Lake South High School. I am so thankful for those who served as the people of Lake in the Hills United Methodist Church, and for all those who have been faithfully serving as the people of Christ United Methodist Church. And I am so honored to be a part of God's ministry with all of God's family.

As I am now serving in my 5th year at Christ U.M.C. one key word comes to mind: "transition." We have and continue to be experiencing many transitions. As a preacher, preaching without notes has always been very challenging for me; I am so glad that I made a decision to make this transition at the beginning of this year. When I preach without notes, I clearly see that people get into the message. Their response truly helps me define my identity as a pastor in bringing a relevant message each week.

We are also experiencing a transition in Leadership Building. In February our Administrative Board (Chairperson: Debbie Thomas) hosted a workshop to align all our leaders to share and accomplish their goals and directions. I am working with our Ad Board Chairperson and our Lay Leader (Gary Slagle) as "Team One" for Intentional Leadership Building so that, with God's guidance we can move forward together.

We experienced another transition in our Children's Ministry. For more than 20 years, Cheryl Fournier devoted herself to this ministry. Now, Julie Kukreja and Chris Patrylak are stepping up to continue this ministry in Journeyland in order for our children to learn about the most important compass - Jesus Christ, and to become faithful disciples throughout their life journey.

The Building Enhancement Team's effort is going to bring another transition. As a follow up to our "Path to the Future" visioning conference held in April 2012 this team has been looking for ways to connect to the community by enhancing our visibility. Our leaders are aware that the real change we want to see won't come just from changing the physical aspect of our church building, but from the transformation by the power of the Holy Spirit. Hence, 14 members of our church family have joined an in-depth Bible Study called "Covenant" which started this fall. Surely this will bring a change in our ministry together as they learn how to love God and others better.

I am so thankful for all our ministry and mission team members and for all those individuals who are serving invisibly. It was especially meaningful to be able to support the needs of the local community by having our church families provide school supplies, and also by our participation in a Rally for the Residents of Carpentersville. I also participated in a meeting with various community leaders, including the Superintendent of School District 158, a Chief of Police, a Village Manager, a Social-worker, as well as other local area pastors where we discussed issues concerning students at school. There are so many incidents of bullying and harassment and abuse, often coming from family and economic transitions. We have agreed to build a "network" to work together.

As I close this report, I am clearly seeing "much fruits" and more seeds - some visible, some invisible. Thanks be to God. And thank you to all of the people of the Christ United Methodist Church.
